Program Summary Information:

- Declaring the Major: Minimum of 2.7 GPA requirement; Passing scores on all three parts of the Praxis Core or acceptable alternatives (SAT or ACT scores); Grades in SPED 2100 and either EDUC 1100 or EDUC 2100 of “C” or above. Students must also complete an “*Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program*” in the Office of Teacher Education Advising and Licensure (TEAL) in the Cato College of Education.
- Advising (Dual Program): Students in the Dual Program will attend mandatory advising sessions each semester. The Director of the Dual Program will facilitate the meetings.
- Advising (General Education): By advisors in the Office of TEAL in the Cato College of Education.
- Minimum Grades/GPA: GPA of 2.5 or higher must be maintained; Grades in professional education and concentration coursework must be “C” or above and the overall GPA in these courses must be a 2.75.
- Teacher Licensure: YES, Special Education and Elementary Education provide a Special Education – General Curriculum K-6 license and an Elementary Education K-6 license.
- Night Classes Available: NO.
- Weekend Classes Available: NO.
- Other information: A yearlong internship (YLI) is a requirement for completion of the major. This YLI must begin one semester prior to student teaching. An application is required for admission to the YLI and must be completed early in the semester prior to beginning the YLI - see Office of Field Experiences’ website (ofe.uncc.edu) for YLI application deadlines. Student teaching is required the last semester upon completing all other coursework required for the Dual Program. Student teaching requires an additional application, that students meet all GPA requirements, and must include the Dual Program Director’s recommendation.

Program Requirements:

The Dual Program has a *very structured* curriculum and sequence of courses. Freshmen and sophomores who intend to apply for the Special Education - General Curriculum and Elementary Education K-6 Dual Program are classified as Pre-Education students in the Dual Program. During the pre-education phase students are advised by TEAL advisors regarding General Education and how to meet the requirements for admission into the Dual Program.

Upon completion of the education prerequisite courses and 30 credit hours, students apply for admission to the Special Education - General Curriculum and Elementary Education K-6 Dual Program. Upon admission to the program, students are advised by the Director of the Dual Program where they plan the remainder of their program of studies.

All students seeking to apply to the Special Education - General Curriculum and Elementary Education K-6 Dual Program must submit a completed “*Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program*” to TEAL. The following are the criteria for admissions to Teacher Education and the Dual Program:

Minimum criteria for admission to the Dual program:

- Completion of at least 30 credit hours with grades of “C” or above in General Education requirements.
- Overall GPA of at least 2.7.

- A grade of “C” or above in SPED 2100 and either EDUC 1100 or EDUC 2100.
- Passing scores on all three parts of the Praxis Core (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) or acceptable alternatives (SAT or ACT scores) .
- Completion of the *practice* NC Foundations General Curriculum tests in Canvas.
- Admission application through the TEAL Office.
- Completion of a Professional Statement (see Application for Admission to a Teacher Education Program - Dual Program).
- Pre-advisor's recommendation and approval (TEAL Advisor).

- To be admitted to the Teacher Education Program and take any 3000/4000 level Professional Education courses, students must have completed an admission application through the TEAL office, attained a “C” or above in SPED 2100 and either EDUC 1100 or EDUC 2100, passed all three parts of the Praxis Core test, and attained an overall GPA of at least 2.5 in at least 30 credit hours of coursework.
- In accordance with legislation enacted in 1992 by the North Carolina General Assembly, the State Board of Governors had directed that undergraduates should enroll in at least 15 credit hours per term, thereby enabling a full-time student to complete a baccalaureate degree program in four years or the equivalent.
